Radiocarbon Testing Shows Lake Minnetonka North Arm Dugout Canoe One of the Oldest in Minnesota

LONG LAKE, MN – Recent radiocarbon testing results indicate the Native American dugout canoe at the Western Hennepin County Pioneer Association (WHCPA) Museum in Long Lake is one of the oldest of its kind ever found in Minnesota. A study from Maritime Heritage Minnesota (MHM) released today reports the WHCPA dugout canoe was constructed between AD 1025-1165, making it about 1,000 years old.

"We were pleasantly surprised to learn this canoe is far older than previously thought," said WHCPA President Russ Ferrin. "The radiocarbon testing show this canoe to be one of the premier archeological finds in Minnesota," Mr. Ferrin continued, "and we are proud to display this rare artifact in our Museum."

Some scholars have suggested dugout canoes, made from hollowed tree trunks, were the earliest form of water transportation in Minnesota.

Ann Merriman, PhD and Christopher Olson, MA, nautical archaeologists with MHM, briefly examined the dugout at the WHCPA Museum in June 2013. MHM subsequently obtained a Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Grant, part of the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund of the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment to conduct a comparative study of 8 dugout canoes recovered in Minnesota. The grant included funding for radiocarbon analysis and research about when and where the Minnesota dugouts were recovered. MHM returned to the WHCPA in January 2014 to document the Lake Minnetonka dugout. MHM plans to continue documenting more dugout canoes with Minnesota provenience since two more of these watercraft have been located in Beltrami and Blue Earth Counties, with hopefully more to come. MHM urges other Minnesota museums and historical societies to come forward with information about other dugout canoes to add to our growing list. These types of artifact studies are part of MHM's mission to locate, document, preserve, and conserve Minnesota's finite maritime and nautical cultural resources within a not-for-profit paradigm, where the health and safety of the artifacts studied is paramount.

The WHCPA dugout found in Lake Minnetonka in 1934, a year when many Minnesota lakes experienced extremely low water levels. While Gustave A. Gunnarson and his sons, Arthur and Helmer, were extending their dock on the southwest shore of North Arm in August 1934, one of their dock posts would not penetrate the lake bottom. Thinking they had struck a sunken log buried under about 12 inches of lake bottom silt, the Gunnarsons extracted the obstruction and dragged it onto the shore.

After removing embedded silt and clay, the Gunnarsons realized they had something far more significant than a submerged log because the object had been hollowed out in the shape of a canoe. The dugout is 11.1 feet in length, 1.4 feet wide and .55 feet deep.
